#### January Meeting Recap

After welcoming us to the first meeting of 2006, President Lee held a

special election to replace departing Vice-President Tony Hale. Fortunately, Ray Waters has volunteered to serve. Ray was elected by acclimation.

The pre-endorsement caucus will be held April 1 in Harbor City. Based on our 833 membership count, BCDC is entitled to 40+ delegates. Those interested in serving should notify Lee.

Lee gave an update on the upcoming candidates' forum to be sponsored by several south bay Democ-

ratic clubs including BCDC. The consortium's goal is to present statewide candidates a week ahead of the Convention. The membership voted to contribute \$250 for seed money. Anyone wanting to help should contact Lee

George Nakano spoke next in order to address a number of rumors that made the rounds during the special election for Mike Gordon's assembly seat. Nakano stood accused of exerting improper influence in the contest between Ted Lieu and Jim Aldinger. He stated emphatically that the rumors were completely baseless.

Nakano said that during World War II, he and thousands of other people were confined to internment camps as victims of allegations that proved to be completely false and he stressed how personally important it is to get the truth out and clear the air. His speech was followed by a round of applause. Jim Aldinger then spoke about the undergrounding controversy in Manhattan Beach. A citizens commit-

tee has been formed to address the issues of homeowners who oppose the undergrounding and/or cannot afford to pay for it.

Regarding the recent sewage spill, Aldinger said that the city is still trying to learn what caused the systems to fail.

Lee announced that Linda Wolin will step down from her seat on the Hermosa Beach School Board because her family is relocating to Northern California.

Harry Whittington became the latest victim of the Gang



Who Can't Shoot Straight last week, becoming the first person since Alexander Hamilton to be shot by a sitting Vice President.

Dick Cheney's hunting "accident" became great fodder for the late-night comedians. David Letterman declared that "we have finally located weapons of mass destruction ... It's Dick Cheney." Jay Leno claimed that after the shooting, Cheney yelled out, "anyone else want to call domestic wire tapping illegal?" And on the Daily Show, "Vice Presidential Firearms Mishap Analyst" Rob Corddry deadpanned that "in a post-9-11 world, the American people expect their leaders to be decisive. To not have shot his friend in the face would have sent a message to the quail that America is weak."

As the saying goes, it's funny, but only because it's true.

Jon Stewart, who was visibly giddy, noted that it was "easy to make fun of an incident like this. Very easy." The late-night hosts and other jokesters could easily point out the irony that Dick Cheney could accidentally shoot a man, but George W. Bush could not

capture Osama bin Laden, the only 6'4" Arab man on dialysis in Afghanistan. It was easy to joke that Cheney's mishap was secretly retribution for questioning the unabashedly illegal wire-tapping program that the administration has brazenly continued. And of course, the idea that this was OK because 9-11 had "changed everything" was just like the excuse they have given for every other foolish, poorly-planned, poorly-executed, fraudulent, or outright illegal action that this administration has done in the last 4 ½ years. It turns out, that the joke is on us.

An old saying says that life repeats itself, first as tragedy, then as comedy. Here, the shooting mishap is a perfect comic repeat of this administration's failures. A blatant mistake resulting from careless machismo, an effort to hide the information from the public until Karl Rove could sweep in and provide a PR strategy which, inevitably, blamed the man who was shot in the face rather than the VP with the shotgun. And then, after furiously spinning, and despite being discredited by nearly every expert, they try to change the subject.

From the Iraq War, to the record budget deficits, to the Medicare Drug Debacle, to the response to Katrina, the Gang Who Can't Shoot Straight has had the same philosophy. Ready. Shoot. Aim.

#### **Support Clean Money**

Tony Hale spoke to the club on the Clean Money Campaign. He opened by thanking Senator Bowen for sponsoring AB 583, the Clean Money and Fair Elections Act. Clean Money candidates who collect 500 signatures along with a \$5 donation can receive enough public financing to run a viable campaign.

If Clean Money candidates are outspent by privately funded

candidates, they receive matching funds up to a limit, which in California is \$900,000.

The program is working well in Arizona, where 55% of all candidates ran Clean Money campaigns, and in Maine, which boasts 87%. Assemblyman Ted Lieu is leaning toward support of AB 583 as is Speaker Nuñez.

The club voted to endorse AB 583.

# Campaigns and Clean Money

Our surprise guest was Senator Debra Bowen, speaking on her upcoming run for Secretary of State. She started off with a litany of the reasons why 2006 is the year of the Democrats.

Noting that the foundation of Bush's presidency is starting to crum-

ble, she listed scandal after scandal: over illegal spying, the Alito nomination, kickbacks, and other ethical lapses. In California, we just saw Governor

Schwartzenegger's agenda go down to resounding defeat. People are starting to realize they made a mistake in electing Republican leaders; and the great thing about democracy is that we can correct our mistakes.

First, we need to take corporate money out of the initiative process. This month, AB 583—the Clean Money and Fair Elections Act—will finally be voted on in the Assembly. The bill will help establish a Clean Money system of public funding of election campaigns for statewide and legislative races in California. Bowen is proud of the fact that 60% of the people who contribute to her campaigns are small donors who gave less than \$100.

Her campaign is in good shape. She said she's in the race for two reasons: Florida and Ohio. She is focusing on voting issues—how votes are tabulated, and whether or not the Diebold machinery should be certified for use in our state.

The "independent testing" done by our current Secretary of State is highly questionable. Every claim about Diebold's reliability has been proved unsound, yet the Governor and Secretary continue to allow their voting machines in 17 counties.

A model voting system is that used in Sacramento county. Voters use a touch screen, verify their vote, and then cause a paper ballot to be submitted. The

accuracy, clarity, and a paper trail. As a senator, Bowen gained technical expertise in information technology and passed legislation on data security and

ensures

identity protection. Her landmark law banning companies from using Social Security numbers as public identifiers makes it much more difficult for criminals to commit identity theft. She plans to make consumer privacy a priority.

So far, she has received endorsements from Senator Gil Sedillo and Speaker Fabian Nuñez, Emily's List, and several trade unions including the Teamsters. The only other Democrat in the race is Deborah Ortiz, a state senator from Sacramento.

Bowen chose this race because she wants to raise the quality of public information. The Secretary of State is responsible for reporting on such critical issues as campaign contributions, domestic partnerships, and end of life preferences. Bowen challenged members to visit the current Secretary of State website and try to figure out how much money oil companies have

Next, we were introduced to Jeff DuClos, the Hermosa Beach candidate who finished fourth in the race to fill three city council seats. Since Howard Fishman withdrew, the city is holding a special election in June.

DuClos is a public relations executive, environmental activist, and

teacher of communications at California State University, Dominguez Hills. As a 15-year member of the Surfrider Foundation, he worked to persuade Hermosa Beach to institute a Pesticide Free Zone in the Green Belt and received the 1999 Environmental Hero Award from VOICE (Volunteers and Organizations Improving the Communities Environment).

The club voted to endorse DuClos and donate the maximum amount, \$250, to his campaign. Lee then offered to match additional personal donations dollar for dollar.
