From the President

Speaker Nancy Pelosi



Pelosi will become the first woman to be the Speaker of the House of Representatives in United States history, the first Californian to become Speaker, and, as third in line to the Presidency, the highest ranking woman in American history.

And most importantly, she will be the first Democratic Speaker in 12 years.

Election Night 2006 was a good night for Democrats—and a good night for America. Two years ago, we suffered a close and disheartening defeat in the national elections. But after six years of the Bush Administration, the American people have made their voices clear. A Democratic wave swept the country this month. Democrats took over control of the House by picking up 30 seats that had been in Republican hands, and picking up 6 seats to gain a majority in the United States Senate. Our historic gains have shifted the balance of power in America. No longer will this administration have an unchecked reign of power.

Even while admitting that it was a "thumpin'," President Bush tried to claim that it was close—it was not. Democrats won 24 of 33 Senate races—72% of the seats in play this year. Yes, there were four close races that went late into the night and even into the next day, (with Democrats winning three of them) but we won 21 races in landslides to the 9 total seats that Republicans won. 54% of Americans voted for Democrats for the House of Representatives. Our margin of victory was nearly four times as large as the "mandate" that

Bush claimed two years ago (and don't forget—he lost in 2000).

With our new power comes great responsibility. Having been in the wilderness for six years, and out of power in Congress for twelve, we will now face the challenge of offering solutions for the problems that our country faces. This, however, is a challenge we welcome. Democrats want to redeploy our troops in Iraq, raise the minimum wage, and provide universal healthcare. And we know that if President Bush vetoes our ideas, we remember that the centerpieces of President Clinton's first year in office was enacting bills (the Family Medical Leave Act and the Motor Voter Act) that his predecessor had vetoed.

In California, we did well too. While we were not able to knock off Arnold, we were able to elect seasoned leaders such as John Garamendi as Lt. Governor, Jerry Brown as Attorney General, and Bill Lockyer as Treasurer, while sending two local Democrats—Debra Bowen and John Chiang—to statewide offices to which they are uniquely qualified.

There are many people who are responsible for these great results locally—Tony Hale, as Executive Director of the Democratic Action Center, Jim Aldinger, Edna Murphy, David Greene, Diane Strack, Ray Waters, Tammy Minion, Dency Nelson, Teresa Bird, and the campaigns of Ted Lieu, Jenny Oropeza, and Jane Harman, and tens of volunteers, students, and many others who made this possible. Over the last two years, I have been known to stand in front of crowds, on chairs, or tables, and yell that we were going to take back Congress. That seemed unlikely two years ago, but today, we know we were successful.

Now we know, all of this is precursor to our most important challenge—taking back the White House in 2008!

Let's win in 2008!

utterly altered.



Led by Senator-elect Sherrod Brown of Ohio, these Democrats will be a new force in Washingtoncommitted to pushing real solutions instead of stale palliatives.
