Community Health Care

What resource do people without health insurance have? Many years ago the South Bay Free Clinic was founded and it has since become South Bay Family Health Care.

At this month's meeting Brooke McIntyre-Tuley and Joanne Silva from the clinic staff will tell us about the services and the unmet health care needs in our community.

This will be an opportunity to find out what's really going on with health care in the South Bay.

One of Los Angeles County's leading community clinics and largest safety net providers, South Bay Family Health Care (SBFHC) offers high-quality lowand no-cost health care to underserved populations in the South Bay and South Los Angeles County. Founded in 1969 as the South Bay Free Clinic, SBFHC has expanded over the last 40 years to accommodate a growing patient base. It now includes four conveniently located health centers—Redondo Beach, Gardena, and two in Inglewood—as well as a school-based clinic at Carson High School and a mobile health van, the Healthy Kids Express.

SBFHC is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) serving more than 17,000 uninsured and underinsured people throughout the South Bay.

As promised in last month's issue, here are the second six of "The Top 12 Plug-in Electric Vehicle Myths," paraphrased



and personalized by me for you, courtesy of Plug In America:

7. MYTH: EVs take too long to charge. FACT: The most convenient place and time to charge is at home while you sleep. That's how I have "fueled" my car 90% of the time for the past 8 years. Even using the slowest 120-volt outlet, the car can be left to charge overnight, producing about 40 miles of range. Most new plug-in electric vehicles will charge from 240-volt outlets, which would provide double or triple the charge in the same amount of time. And charging stations like those the City of Hermosa beach is committing to install will reduce that charging time even more.

8. MYTH: Plug-ins are too expensive for market penetration.

FACT: New technologies are typically costly when first introduced. Then prices drop dramatically as competition and volume pricing come into play. (We saw this soon after cell phones and DVDs were first introduced.) Also, the government stimulus package includes a \$2500 to \$7500 tax credit for these cars, and some states like California offer an additional \$5000 incentive. One must also factor in that these cars' electric "fuel" costs will be about 2 cents a mile or even less, and that these vehicles require almost no maintenance or repair: no oil or filter changes, no tune ups, no smog checks. After almost 8 years and almost 100,000 miles, I am on my third set of tires and my third set of brakes. The only other things I've had to do to my car have been to rotate those tires every 6 months or so and to top off my brake and window washer fluids. That's been about it!

9. MYTH: Batteries will cost \$15,000 to replace after only a few years.

FACT: The battery is the priciest part of a plug-in, and up until now, that definitely has been the major obstacle preventing the electric vehicle from becoming the overwhelming hands-down first choice for car buyers. But costs will drop as production increases, and the technology will improve. Some car makers plan to lease their batteries, so replacement won't be an issue. The Chevy Volt will have a 10-year battery warranty that would cover battery replacement.

10. MYTH: There isn't enough lithium in the world to make all the new batteries.

FACT: Even in the worst-case scenario (zero battery recycling, aggressive EV sales, and no new mining methods or sites), existing lithium stores will be sufficient for projected EV production for the next 75 years. Also, lithium comes from many countries (24% from the United States), so we won't be dependent on any one global region.

11. MYTH: Lithium batteries are dangerous and can explode.

FACT: Many kinds of lithium-ion batteries are found in all kinds of consumer electronic products, and some of those batteries have posed fire risks in some circumstances. These risks are being mitigated by the use of advanced-battery management systems and careful design that prevents "thermal runaway." Most plug-in vehicle makers are working with lithium battery types that have inherent safety advantages and provide more years of service.

12. MYTH: Most of us will still be driving

January Recap

As our acting president, Lori Geittmann opened with the announcement that she will serve in this capacity until the club is able to fill the position of president formally. She called on our treasurer Edna Murphy, who said that we made about \$67 on our January holiday party.

Ray Waters, newly elected to Hermosa Beach School Board, said his city is facing extreme budget cuts. The Education Foundation has helped hold onto teachers and maintain school quality, raising over \$1 million last year and aiming for \$1.5 in the coming year.

The Board is exploring the use of interest-based bargaining, which differs from traditional adversarial negotiations in recognizing that employers and unions have common interests and that the outcome of negotiations can be win-win.

Jane Harman's representative, Rebecca Kim, reported that Jane is currently active on homeland security Issues. She called the Christmas Day airliner bombing attempt a failure of intelligence and said we need "leadership, not laundry lists." The Intelligence Reform Act of 2004 left unfinished the formation of a Privacy and Civil Liberties Board that was supposed to oversee new practices to keep our country safer.

Regarding health care, Harman has always backed the House bill including the public option. Ray commented that in Lee Fink's article last month, he said that what's important is to pass *any* bill, then improve on it.

Our featured speaker, Janice Martin, was up next. Ms. Martin is the director of programs and volunteer services for Habitat for Humanity of Greater Los Angeles. She spoke about the organization's mission, which is to build affordable housing for those who need it most.

Contrary to popular belief, Habitat does not give away homes; they build them for working families who qualify. They provide a "hand up, not a handout," and require a partnership agreement with families who demonstrate a need for

adequate shelter, have good credit, and contribute 500 hours of "sweat equity" toward home construction. Recipients must have a history of steady employment and make mortgage payments, which never exceed 35% of income. In turn, the mortgage proceeds are reinvested to build more houses.

Los Angeles suffers from a severe shortage of affordable housing. This year, the demand for housing in the county will exceed new housing production by about 28 thousand homes. Only about 3% of LA housing is affordable. Nationwide, 95 million people—that's one-third of the population—have housing problems including overcrowding, payments too large a percentage of income, poor quality shelter, and homelessness.

Habitat homes are built using volunteer labor, but the organization uses licensed plumbers, electricians and other specialists for the critical jobs. Ms. Martin said that HHGLA's goal is to build and renovate 250 homes in the region over the next few years in cities such as Lynwood, Burbank, Los Angeles, Long Beach, and the Westside.

Habitat utilizes green technology in their construction; three of their current projects are LEED certified (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design, a Green Buildings rating system). They also operate a Home Improvement Store that sells new and used surplus home furnishings and building materials to the public, saving landfills and reducing waste.

The impact of home ownership is farreaching: children of homeowners are more likely to achieve higher grades in school, less likely to exhibit behavior problems, and more likely to become homeowners themselves. Home owning adults are more likely to vote, participate in civic organizations, and volunteer in their communities.

Volunteer opportunities with Habitat include assisting with maintenance work on Habitat-owned buildings, maintaining databases, documenting construction projects, and helping in the office. Habitat also seeks ambassadors who will advocate for favorable legislation.

Next, Tony Hale spoke about his work on James Lau's campaign for the 53rd Assembly seat. Lau is a committed environmentalist and works with the League of Conservation Voters, an environmental watchdog agency. He has served as a policy consultant for a state senator and as legislative director for a member of the Assembly on environmental issues. He has drafted legislation for a number of bills later signed into law including a landmark consumer protection bill and the creation of a special fund for community centers serving low-income communities.

Tony also said that the DAC office is in full swing and serves as a resource for all Democratic candidates. They remain neutral in all races and focus on projects such as voter registration, signing up almost 2,000 voters in the last 4 months.

Ray Waters passed around petitions to put the Democracy Act on the ballot. The bill would change one sentence of the California Constitution to read: All Legislative actions on revenue and budget must be determined by a majority vote.

This change would end the budget gridlock that plagues our state every year. To vote it into law requires only a simple majority vote. As things stand, the majority of our elected representatives are unable to run the state the way voters want them to. The club has already endorsed this act and donated \$100 to publicize it.

In closing, Lori asked that members notify her of all upcoming events so they can be announced at our meetings.
