BEACH CITIES GREEN

As promised in last month's column, this month I will offer you "The 10 Easiest Ways to Cut Your Energy Use in Half." But first, as a follow-up



to last month's discussion of renewable energy, I am pleased to draw your attention to a late-breaking statement from Prime Minister Naoto Kan of Japan, on the two-month anniversary of that country's nuclear crisis: "...Japan will scrap a plan to obtain half of its electricity from nuclear power and will instead promote renewable energy." Similarly, earlier this week, Germany's Prime Minister, Angela Merkel, said that Germany will take steps toward closing the last of their 17 nuclear plants, and will replace them with wind farms, natural gas plants and solar facilities by 2020.

And now, here are 10 really simple ways to cut your energy use in half. Mind you, some of these tips will have more impact in areas of harsher climate than what we enjoy in the Beach Cities, but they all help remind us of the many small yet effective things we can do:

- 1. Save 2% Be mindful of shutting off lights when you leave a room. For even greater savings, replace all of your bulbs with CFLs or LEDs. About 10 years ago, I switched 10 of my most frequently used 65- and 75-watt incandescent bulbs to 14-watt CFLs, and in one month my electricity use dropped by 100 kilowatt hours.
- Save 19% Place Energy Star ceiling fans in the rooms you use most often. This is one of the

- solutions that has more of an impact in areas of harsher heat and cold than what we have here in the South Bay, where instead of using ceiling fans, we should remember to take advantage of the natural cooling breezes created by opening our doors and windows to allow air flow to occur. We should also remember to close those same windows and doors to retain heat when that is desirable.
- 3. Save 4% Your refrigerator is one of the biggest energy users in your house. Clean the coils every six months to keep it running efficiently. If the refrigerator is relatively empty, take up some of the unused interior space with jugs of water, to retain the cold better. If your refrigerator was made before 1993, consider replacing it with a newer, Energy Star model.
- Save 9% Wash your clothes in cold water, and air dry them either indoors or out if possible. Drying your clothes on an outdoor line or indoor rack can save around \$100 in energy costs every year.
- Save 12% Upgrade all your appliances to Energy Star models.
 Appliances use 20% of the energy in the average US home.
- Save 1 to 3% Wrap your water heater with an insulating blanket. Depending on the heater's location, this can reduce heat loss by 24 to 45%. Turn the temperature control on the unit down by 10 degrees if possible.
- Save 12% Plug air leaks.
 Weatherstrip around doors and windows. Again, this is less of an

(Green, continued from page 1) issue in the temperate Beach Cities, but an inexpensive improvement.

- 8. Save 10% Use a programmable thermostat. Target it for 68 degrees when you are at home in the winter and 55 degrees when you are away. In summer set the target at 78 degrees when you are at home and 82 degrees when you are away. Again, not so much a Beach Cities issue; just be mindful of unnecessary heating or cooling.
- Save 3% Air-dry dishes. Using a fully loaded dishwasher saves more water than hand washing those dishes, but skip the drying cycle. You'll save energy and

- money. Also, skip the pre-rinsing before loading the dishes. It saves water and actually allows the dishwasher to do its job better.
- 10. Save 5% To eliminate "phantom load," unplug your electronics when you're not using them, or plug them into a power strip and switch it off.

That's just a quick teaser to whet your appetite for even more savings of energy and money. Find more tips at www. GreenAmerica.org/go/efficiencyfirst. You may not think these small changes can add up, but the City of Hermosa Beach recently reported that over the past 5 years such measures reduced the electricity use in city buildings and facilities by 15%, saving over \$50,000 a year. There's plenty more that the city and all of us can

April Recap

City and State Politics

Our April meeting covered a wide-ranging agenda from redistricting to Convention planning, and included updates from some of our local officials.

Hermosa Beach City Councilman Howard Fishman talked about recent moves by the city to curtail government spending. At their April 26 meeting, the Council unanimously approved new two-tiered labor agreements with seven of its unions that will reduce the city's pension costs for new hires. Existing staff will maintain their current pension plans, but new hires will receive a reduced pension benefit, raising the retirement age and reducing the percentage of salary paid out.

The changes are different for the various unions: Police and firefighters will maintain their current retirement age of 50, although new hires will receive a lower percentage—2% instead of the previous 3%— of their annual salary multiplied by the number of years they worked. Other city employees who currently enjoy a retirement age of 55 will now see that raised to 60, but with no change in their 2% pension formula.

Fishman also reported that Hermosa Beach offered early retirement to ten employees, freeing up funds to hire two new police officers, a police captain, and a public works director. The city has adopted a four-day work week, with tenhour days, to save overhead costs, and is



making more public services, such as bill paying, available on the Internet.

Next we heard from Ted Lieu's representative Veronica Zendejas. She brings a wealth of experience to the job, having worked fifteen years for the late Senator Jenny Oropeza. She said that Lieu's office in Sacramento is now fully staffed and their local office is located at 2512 Artesia Boulevard in Redondo Beach. Measures being introduced by the Senator currently include prohibition of youths under eighteen from the use of tanning beds, and a bill to help prevent animal abuse by banning their sale on sidewalks and street corners and increasing penalties for animal neglect. There is also a bill that seeks to improve financial literacy by allowing public school teachers to give instruction in "real life" money management.

Ray Waters reported from the Hermosa Beach School Board, saying that the district continues to be strapped financially and was recently forced to lay off ten of its teachers. He said that some school districts are facing insolvency. In the past, the Education Foundation has been able to raise funds directly from parents, asking for up to \$1,000 per family. But this year the contributions have fallen off, and the board is considering its alternatives, including a parcel tax, charter schools, and merging with adjacent school districts.

We discussed the upcoming Party Convention and President Lori Geittmann brought in a petition to create an Education Caucus. Lori then announced that she will step down as acting president in June, at the end of the Club's fiscal year. She has put together a nominating committee for new officers which consists of Ray Waters, Teresa Bird, and Edna Murphy, and plans to ask Bobbi Buescher and Dency Nelson to participate.
